 challenging them to engage in the put off, mind renewal, and put on dynamic of Ephesians 4:22 24."
- Christian Counseling and Education Foundation (CCEF), Executive Director Tim Lane: "Biblical counseling involves walking patiently with someone, while wisely connecting them to Christ through the grace-centered message of the Bible. This one-on-one ministry is done in the community of the church where both the normal and complex problems of daily life can be addressed."
- 3. <u>Counseling Solutions Group</u>, President Rick Thomas: "Compassionately and competently bringing relational care to others through the means of God's Word and the local church."

The Big Question: "When Canyon Hills Community Church says it provides "biblical counseling," what does that mean? The following is a definition for biblical counseling based on these 6-Definitions? -"Biblical counseling is an intensely focused time of discipleship which involves walking lovingly and patiently with someone, building relationship and taking the time to understand them and their present circumstances of their life through the lens of Scripture; while wisely connecting them to Christ through the means of God's many graces realized in His transforming Word, the ministry of the indwelling Spirit, and the help and hope found within the local church for the purpose of generating Godglorifying change, so that the follower of Christ may experience greater joy in their daily life and relationship with God and others." The Second Question -What are the Various of Counseling that Make Biblical Counseling... BIBLICAL? Element #1: This kind of counseling requires that an individual possesses a new regenerated by the Gospel of Jesus Christ (1 Cor 2:14; Rom 15:14) 1 Corinthians 2:14, "The natural person does not accept the things of the Spirit of God, for they are folly to him, and he is **not** able to understand them **because** they are spiritually discerned." SO THE POINT IS... like in 1 Corinthians 2:14, the natural unsaved/non- regenerate man is unable to accept and receive the truths of God's Word. It is not that the unredeemed person is not intelligent... they simply lack a new regenerated heart and empowering ministry of the indwelling Spirit of God in their life, in order to change in a way that glorifies and pleases God (Isa 43:7; 2 Cor 5:9).

Element #2: This kind of counseling is based on the counselor's faithfulness to provide Scripturally based (2 Tim 3:16-17)

- The Bible is SUFFICIENT for life in that, when properly interpreted, it reveals to the believer
 all the data necessary for one to understand his need for Christ, how he can please the Lord,
 and how to live in a God-honoring way regardless of the circumstances whether easy or
 difficult.
- The Bible is also the AUTHORITATIVE source with which all truth claims— including claims made
 by science and history—must be evaluated. As a result, we reject all counseling theories that use
 presuppositions theories, principles, or methodologies that are inconsistent with the proper
 interpretation and understanding of the Scriptures and the CreatorGod!

The Word of God gives us everything we need for godly living (2 Pet 1:3). The Scriptures, rightly interpreted and carefully applied, offer us all-encompassing insight for life. The Apostle Paul, in 2 Timothy 3:16-17 reveals that the Scriptures are sufficient for making sense out of life from God's perspective and not man's! Element #3: This kind of counseling will be (2 Tim 3:16-17; Exod. 3:14) Biblical counseling will also be theological because it is based on utilizing the entire Bible and what it teaches us today about any topic or life issues. Therefore, biblical counseling will help the follower of Christ connect: Their understanding of man (anthropology) The Fall and impact of personal sin, depravity, and suffering (hamartiology) The solution to the problems that man faces living in a fallen and sin-sick world by embracing the help and hope found in the Gospel of Jesus Christ and grace, which offers eternal salvation and provides the suffering sinner with daily victory in their ongoing battle against the world, the flesh, and the devil (soteriology). Element #4: This kind of counseling can be a _____ or term process Matthew 18:15-17, "If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault, between you and him alone. If he listens to you, you have gained your brother. 16 But if he does not listen, take one or two others along with you, that every charge may be established by the evidence of two or three witnesses. 17 If he refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church. And if he refuses to listen even to the church, let him be to you as a

THE POINT: Effective God glorifying and pleasing biblical counseling **does not rely on personal opinions or preferences**... it relies on **accurately, lovingly and graciously** sharing with another follower of Christ the authoritative and transforming truths of God's Word! (2 Timothy 3:16)

Matthew 18 is the "biblical

Gentile and a tax collector."

for restoring God's people within the local church!"

Element #5: This kind of counseling is totally dependent on the ministry of the indwelling to cause genuine spiritual heart change of heart and transformation of an individual's life (John 14:15-16:16; 2 Cor 3:17- 18).

It is the **Spirit of God** (e.g. Matt 3:16) who illuminates or provides the individual with understanding of the truths of Scripture and also empowers a follower of Christ to apply these truths to their daily life. Therefore, any real and lasting spiritual heart attitude change is dependent upon the indwelling **Spirit of Christ's** ministry in our daily life!

• Romans 8:9, "You, however, are not in the flesh but in the Spirit, if in fact the Spirit of Goddwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him."

As the Holy Spirit lives in the believer, He brings about some life- changing results:

- The indwelling Spirit comes to a soul dead in sin and creates new life (Titus 3:5). This is the new birth Jesus spoke of in John 3:1-8.
- 2. The indwelling Spirit confirms to the believer that he belongs to the Lord and is an heir of God and fellow-heir with Christ (Rom 8:15-17).
- 3. The indwelling Spirit installs the new believer as a member of Christ's universal church. This is the baptism of the Spirit, according to 1 Corinthians 12:13.
- 4. The indwelling Spirit gives spiritual gifts (God-given abilities for service) to the believer to edify the church and serve the Lord effectively for His glory (1 Cor 12:11)
- The indwelling Spirit helps the believer understand and apply the Scripture to his daily life (1 Cor 2:12)
- The indwelling Spirit enriches the believer's prayer life and intercedes for him in prayer (Rom 8:26-27).
- 7. The indwelling Holy Spirit empowers the yielded believer to live for Christ to do His will (Gal 5:16).

 The Spirit leads the believer in paths of righteousness (Rom8:14).
- 8. The indwelling Spirit gives evidence of new life by producing the fruit of the Spirit in the believer's life (Gal 5:22-23)
- 9. The indwelling Spirit is grieved when the believer sins (Eph 4:30), and He convicts the believer to confess his sin to the Lord so that fellowship is restored (1 John 1:9).
- 10. The indwelling Spirit seals the believer unto the day of redemption so that the believer's arrival in the Lord's presence is guaranteed after this life (Eph 1:13-14).

The Takeaway... When a pastor is preaching on Sunday... he is communicating the transforming truths of God's Word, instructing them in what it says, and how to apply the truths to them! **THE RESULT...** is God glorifying preaching that targets the heart of God's people providing either **PREVENTATIVE** or **RESTORATIVE** discipleship, counseling, and care for the souls of God's people.

In addition... LifeGroups or Small Groups are also discipleship and counseling-oriented and are meant to be intentional and purposeful in providing help and hope from the Scriptures for those struggling with life issues or habitual sin!

Element #9: This kind counseling seeks to cause______- glorifying change in the lives of God's people (1 Cor. 10:31; Matt. 5:16)

ANSWER: Spiritual heart –based transformation - the **Counselee** is commanded to change through the ministry of the Word and indwelling Spirit of God in their life.

Final Thoughts...

Why is a "BIBLICAL" counseling ministry important?

• Colossians 1:28, "Him we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone with all wisdom, that we may present everyone mature in Christ." The Apostle Paul wrote this letter to the believers in Colossae to teach us, "Him we proclaim, [WE are] warning everyone and, [WE are] teaching everyone with all wisdom, that [WE] may present everyone mature in Christ."

THE POINT: Biblical counseling is one of the many ministries within the local church that assists the follower of Christ to grow more and more into the image of Christ.

What does all of this mean for you?

Answer: God desires for you to grow in Christ and eventually be prepared to provide help and hope to others within Christ's church – 2 Timothy 2:15, "Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly handling the word of truth."

What Does Biblical Counseling Desire to Change?

ANSWER: It desires to not just change the follower of Christ's **OUTWARD ACTIONS**, but their **INWARD HEART ATTITUDES!**

A Biblical Counseling Reality: *The Problem is NOT the Problem...but the Problem is the Heart...* No follower of Christ or biblical counselor possesses the power to change the heart of others... ONLY GOD CAN CHANGE THE HEART! -

"A new heart also will I give you, and a new spirit will I put within you: and I will take away the stony heart out of your flesh, and I will give you a heart of flesh. And I will put My Spirit within you, and cause you to walk in My Statutes (i.e. the Scriptures), and ye shall keep My Judgments (i.e. the Scriptures), and do them... Without Me ye can do nothing" (Ezek. 36:26-27; John 15:5).

As a person's INWARD spiritual heart begins to change through the transforming truths of God's Word and power of the Spirit of God... it is then that their OUTWARD actions and behaviors will begin to experience lasting (not temporary) change.



We cannot trust our emotions to accurately reflect truth. We must go to God's word for Truth. Just because you have a strong emotion does not mean you need to obey it.





Video #8 – An Essential Element to Biblical Change: Forgivenes	S

INTRODUCTION: Biblical counseling is all about helping people grow, as they become more and more like their Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. In 1 Timothy 1:5, the Apostle Paul reminds the biblical counselor, "The aim of our charge is love that issues from a pure heart and a good conscience and a sincere faith" (cf. Col 1:28), It is the unique ministry of change that centers on the grace of God's Word and Spirit to communicated transforming truth which leads to true salvation in Christ, which will produce a love for God that will result in a purified spiritual heart attitude (2 Tim 2:22; 1 Pet 1:22), along with a cleansed conscience (Heb 9:22; 10:14), and a genuine faith (Heb 10:22). In addition, another unique result of true biblical counseling will be a love of choice and the will, characterized by self-denial and self-sacrifice for the benefit others, which is the mark of a true Christian (John 13:35; Rom 13:10; 1 Cor 13:1-7; 1 John 4:7-8).


In the counselee's pursuit of knowing, loving and serving their Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, they must possess a deep theological understanding of <u>sin and guilt</u>, <u>repentance and faith</u>, <u>forgiveness and replacement</u> (this includes spiritual heart/mind renewal or the process of "putting off putting on"), in order to experiencing lasting biblical change.

But be warned, it is possible to go on holding a grudge <u>if</u> your faith in Christ simply means that you continue to look back to the Cross and concluded that <u>you</u> are "off the hook" for the penalties of your own sin... but you <u>fail to allow the Cross to inform your heart</u> and <u>how you respond to others who have offended and sinned against you!</u> Rather our faith in Christ must compel us to look back not merely to discover that we are forgiven of our sins by our kind God, but will in turn compels us to be a forgiving people!

PROPOSITION: The Lord's Prayer describes forgiveness as being pardoned of personal sin debts, as well as pardoning others who have sin against us. So what does the Word of God have to say about God's grace and how followers of Christ are forgiven as well as empowered to forgive others?

This lesson will address the various facets of biblical forgiveness:

a) The primary Greek verb translated "forgive" (aphiemi) (pronounced: ah-fi-emi) focuses on the of forgiveness, which is "to send away" or "to release." them in Hell, because Christ has paid it all. The forgiven sinner now enters into a new relationship: God is no longer his Judge; now He is his Father.

Because God acts as a judge, he declares us righteous forever and delivering us from eternal condemnation because of our personal sin (Rom 4:3-8; Col 2:13-14).

Forgiveness Needed After Salvation is Called Forgiveness – With parental forgiveness, God is no longer the Judge, but the Father! So when the follower of Christ sins, their fellowship in the family of God is broken. While the child of God has not lost their salvation, he has sacrificed for a time his joy of salvation. In addition, he may experience the discipline of his Father, designed to bring him back into fellowship. As soon as the child confesses his sin, he receives parental forgiveness.

While judicial forgiveness takes place once-for-all at the time of at salvation; parental forgiveness takes place every time a believer confesses and forsakes his sin. This is what Jesus taught in John 13:8-10 reminding believers that

we need the bath of regeneration <u>only once</u> to deliver us from the penalty of sins and Hell, but we need many cleansings throughout our walk with Christ to give us parental forgiveness.

- The ______Between the "Judicial Forgiveness" and the "Parental Forgiveness" of God¹:
 - ✓ Judicial forgiveness deals with sin's penalty; whereas parental forgiveness deals with sin's consequences.
 - ✓ Judicial forgiveness frees us from the condemnation of the righteous, omniscient Judge whom we have wronged; whereas parental forgiveness sets things right with a grieving and displeased but loving Father.
 - ✓ Judicial forgiveness provides an unshakeable standing before the throne of divine judgment; whereas parental forgiveness deals with the state of our sanctification or spiritual growth at any given moment and is dispensed from a throne of divine grace. Thus, the forgiveness Christians are supposed to seek out in their daily walk is not pardon from an <u>angry Judge</u>, but mercy from a grieved Father.

 - The Question: Now Mark 11:25 and Matthew 6:12 could imply that a believer is to forgive everyone, whether they confess it or not, and therefore Christians are just to forgive. However, a solid hermeneutic of the Scriptures will not build a theology on two verses. Now is forgiveness conditional or is it not?
 - The Answer: The overall testimony of the Scripture's teaches that God's forgiveness is CONDITIONAL..., <u>BUT</u> His heart desire is to forgive as seen in Psalm 32:1, "Blessed is the one whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered." The covering mentioned here is described later in Psalm 51:1-19, for once the sin is repented of, then the sin is forgiven and covered (cf. Ps 85:2).

Just as God <u>does not</u> make His promise of pardon to people unless they repent (Luke 3:3; Acts 2:38), therefore the follower of Christ <u>cannot</u> actually say "I forgive you" to another believer unless they first admit their sin and repent = "transaction of forgiveness."

- > Confronting vs. Covering? Psalm 27:5 points out that open admonishment or rebuke is better than the love that conceals sin. The "covering of love" only takes place after the sin of another has been repented and forgiveness has taken place.
- Apologizing/Sorry vs. Asking for Forgiveness? When an individual "apologizes", in general they are expressing regret or that they are sorry for a wrong or injury. However, those who simply apologize are expressing [verbally or not] a secondary meaning that is attempting to give a defense or vindication for something they have done. Many who give an apology present a mixture of expressing regret or remorse for a wrong or injury... while also giving a defense or vindication for what they have done. Therefore, they are expressing remorse for the result of what they did, but not for what they did.

On the other hand, forgiveness is a "pardon for something that has been done. When an individual asks for forgiveness it requires humility because they have to admit that they have actually done something wrong and desiring to repent or turn from that act. This is why God uses *forgiveness of sin to save the lost* and not *grief or sorrow from sin*.

Bottomline, an "apology is not asking for forgiveness, rather it is simply being sorrowful for what someone did. For example, both Judas and Cain experienced worldly grief or sorrow, "For godly grief produces a repentance that leads to salvation without regret, whereas worldly grief produces death" (2 Cor 7:10); and the result of Judas' or Cain's worldly grief was spiritual disaster and death.

An apology is simply not taking responsibility for one's actions, but biblical forgiveness takes responsibility for sin.

- What About Forgiving God? We do not have to forgive God because He never sins.
- What About Forgiving Unbelievers? The believer is experiencing a process of "turning the other cheek" for the non-believer is not capable of dealing with biblical forgiveness. However, the follower of Christ can tell them "it's OK" and usethis

situation as an opportunity for evangelism, sharing the Gospel, and how God can provide them with the wondrous gift of eternal forgiveness.

Keep in mind that the believer should not forgive a non-believer, because it does not reflect a biblical reality, for only believers can be forgiven. However their still remains a Gospel opportunity to point them to the One who can forgive them of all their sins, past, present, and future, resulting in salvation and the hope of eternal life. For a believer, the process of forgiveness involves loving biblical confrontation, according to Matthew 18; whereas for an unbeliever it would involve loving them and sharing the hope of the Gospel, if possible.

- ➤ What About Forgiving Dead People? The follower of Christ is not called to forgive dead people. As far as their sin is concerned, either Jesus has forgiven them, and they are in Heaven's glory or the consequences for their unrepentant and unforgiven sin are taking place in Hell. Only those who are alive can repent of sin with the Father and seek forgiveness and reconciliation.
- > What About Forgiving Ourselves? There is no doctrine or scriptural support about forgiving self! According to 1 John 1:9, it is God who forgives based on saving faith trusting in Jesus as Savior and Lord.

However, even though a person has experienced freedom from the bondage of sin (Romans chapters 6-8), they can still choose to remain in it and act as though they were never freed from it.

What About Guilty Feelings? - The follower of Christ can accept the fact that they are forgiven in Christ (Jer 31:34), or they can believe the devil's lie that they are still guilty and should therefore feel guilty. However, if the believer has sought out forgiveness from former sins but they are reminded of them, they can choose to dwell on those forgiven sins (with the resulting guilty feelings), or they can choose to fill their spiritual heart/mind with thoughts of a faithful God who forgives, while also thanking and praising Him for His grace and forgiveness (Phil 4:8; Mark 9:24).

Therefore, remembering one's sins should simply remind us to forgive others as they have been forgiven by God (Matt 18:21-35). However, there are people who don't forgive themselves because they really don't want to forget their former sins, choosing to continue to relive them in their minds or actually continue to actively pursue them in their daily life. This is sin and must be confessed and repented (Matt 5:28). This continuing cycle of sin and guilt is damaging to one's personal relationship with Christ and process of sanctification.

What About One Believer Showing Unforgiveness to Another Believer? - This is when someone admits they have sinned, have exercised repentance and are asking for forgiveness (transaction), BUT the offended person says "no" to forgiving that individual. Practical Application: The best way to understand biblical forgiveness is to realize one's own spiritual heart attitude and need for forgiveness to be granted by the Creator, Lord, and Savior. Remembering that our sins are forgiven should make it easier to forgive others of their sins (Matt 7:1-5; 1 Tim 1:15). In addition, forgiveness should remind us of the grace of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ who forgave us and is drawing us closer in loving obedience to Him (Psa 103:2-3,10-14; Rom 5:10). God will allow our sin to come to mind (Satan may intend it for an evil purpose, but God allows it for a good purpose), but He wants us to accept His forgiveness and rejoice in His grace. So, the next time your former sins come to mind, don't dwell on the sin... rather dwell upon God's grace and mercies. Philippians 3:13-14, "Brothers, I do not consider that I have made it my own. But one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, ¹⁴ I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus."

Forgiveness does not depend on:

FRUIT, FAITH, or FEELINGS

- **1. Fruits of repentance** are not required (see Luke 17:3)
 - We must give the benefit of the doubt to the person who has offended us
 - We cannot judge the heart of the other person
 - We have to work with the information we have when they say "I repent"
- **2. More Faith** is not needed to forgive (see Luke 17:5)
 - It is a question of obedience; no amounts of faith will do it.
 - You can't say "I just don't have enough faith to forgive." "I'm asking God to give me more faith." Or "I'm asking God to help me forgive."
 - Faith as small as a mustard seed is enough.

- 3. When I Feel like it is not an acceptable condition for the timing of forgiveness
- Obeying God whether I feel like it or not is not hypocritical. It may feel uncomfortable, but it's not hypocrisy.
 - Obeying God is right. It does not instantly remove anxiety, hurts or damages that have occurred but it does stop the development of further sinful patterns.

V. Consequences of Not Forgiving

- Anger / bitterness see Heb. 12:15 "lest any root of bitterness... defile many"
- Self pity see Jonah

3:10-11 "then God saw their works, that they turned from their evil way; and God relented from the disaster that He had said He would bring, and He did not do it. But it *displeased Jonah exceedingly*, and he became angry."

Forgiveness is a Choice

Example Prayer of Forgiveness²:

Matthew 18:21-22 and the Call to Confession:

Then Peter came up and said to him, "Lord, how often will my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? As many as seven times?" ²² Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you seven times, but seventy-seven times.

Prayer of Confession:

Merciful Father,

We have often been quick to judge and slow to forgive our brothers and sisters. We notice and keep score for every sin that others commit against us. Sometimes we punish them by lashing out in anger, while at other times we treat them with silent coldness, instead of extending mercy and grace. We have dismissed their attempts at repentance as insincere words, and have held grudges against them, instead o forgiving them freely. At times, we have not even given them the chance to make amends by graciously showing them their sin but have simply assumed that they would be unwilling to repent.

Thank you, Father, that this is not how you have treated us. You have mercifully accepted our flawed repentance, in spite of our divided hearts. You have not held our sin against us, though we have grieved and sinned against you countless times boldly and brashly, not merely out of ignorance or oversight but with deliberate defiance. Instead you have taken every last one of our sins and crucified them in Jesus, your Son. In place of our failure and sin, you have substituted Christ's perfect obedience and righteousness. Christ's forgiving love pled for the forgiveness o those who were actually crucifying him. We confess that we were the ones who spilt his blood; we have trampled upon your Son. Yet in your grace you see us as having the same forgiving spirit of Christ! We have not been dealt with according to our sins, because Jesus has. We have been given infinite grace by this loving Advocate.

Gracious Lord, help us to worship you in light of these truths. Enable us to love and forgive one another in the same way that you have loved and forgiven us. Teach us to see every sin against us by a brother of sister in Christ having been nailed to the cross. In place of the record that we keep of one another's wrongs, help us to ponder the record of Christ's righteousness, which is sufficient to pay of our brother's sins, just as it has paid for ours. Help us to become people who, knowing that they have been forgiven much, are themselves deeply forgiving, even toward those who have sinned against us many times. In Jesus' mercifully name, Amen!
